### 5) <u>Discussion on Legacy Tree Program:</u>


- Bergeson introduced the idea of starting this program so that residents are more knowledgeable and aware of the large or notable trees throughout the City

Re: March Forestry Activities Report

Preparation for spring tree planting began in March.

- I worked with Brian Wahl from the WIDNR regarding a tree root/sidewalk study that we are partnering on in Stoughton.
- I attended the last of the weekly meetings of the Woody/Ornamentals Species Advisory Group for the DNR Invasive Species Council. These meetings are being held to review currently regulated trees and shrubs under NR40, and also to assess new species to add to the regulated list.
- Tree trimming was concluded in March. Tree Wise Men was contracted for the year to trim larger trees while smaller trees were trimmed by in-house personnel.

# **City of Stoughton Canopy Restoration Project**

The City of Stoughton Public Works Department Forestry Division, along with the Stoughton Tree Commission was awarded a matching fund grant through the Department of Natural Resources Urban Forestry Program. This grant was pursued to help residents replace trees on private property that were removed due to the Emerald Ash Borer (EAB) infestation that has killed thousands of ash trees in the city's urban forest.

The City of Stoughton just finished replacing over 900 trees that were removed due to EAB on city properties, but there are hundreds of trees on private property that were removed but may still need replacing. This project will provide residents of the City of Stoughton with <u>free</u> bare root trees to be planted on private property. Ultimately, the primary goal of the program is to replenish the Urban Forest canopy in response to EAB tree loss on private property.

The City contributed about \$2,000 from funds raised by the sale of lumber from city trees through the City's Urban Wood Utilization Program. These funds were matched by the DNR grant to purchase forty (40) trees of four (4) species (see below) for the Urban Forest Canopy Enhancement Project. These bare root trees were purchased in the spring of 2021, will be grown out in a gravel bed throughout the summer months to improve root structure, and will be ready for planting in the fall of 2021. Bare root trees have higher survivability, improved root structure and are much easier to plant than balled and burlap (B&B) trees.

Three shade trees and one ornamental tree species are available:

## American Linden 'Redmond' (Tilia americana)

Commonly called American Basswood, 'Redmond' is a dense, pyramidal cultivar that has a pyramidal form in youth, maturing into a striking specimen with an upright, oval canopy and a tall, straight trunk. Has more upright branching than the non-cultivar linden species.

- Height of 50-80' and a spread of 30-45'. Medium growth rate of 12" to 24" per year.
- Sun Preference: Full sun and partial shade, a minimum of four hours of sunlight each day.
- Creamy yellow flowers in hanging clusters (5 to 10 flowers per cluster) in early summer. Very fragrant.
- Heart-shaped leaves from 4 to 8 inches long. Summer color is dark green above and lighter green on the lower surface. Fall color pale yellow.

# Quaking Aspen (Populus tremuloides)

The Quaking Aspen that is pyramidal and narrow when young, but develops a characteristic rounded top at maturity. This tree will grow in a wide range of soils. Dark-green foliage turns golden-yellow in fall. Leaves "tremble", even in light winds, creating a very distinctive and pleasant sound.

- Height of 40–50' and a spread of 20–30'. Fast growth rate of more than 24" per year.
- Sun Preference: Full sun and partial shade, a minimum of four hours of sunlight each day.
- Provides stunning yellow fall color.
- Has smooth, greenish-white to cream bark on a long, narrow trunk.

# Hackberry (Celtis occidentalis)

The Common Hackberry tree grows in windy exposed locations and in poorer soils. This tree has a wonderful bright and cheery yellow fall color to it. This tree is excellent for both street and specimen plantings in the landscape. It's relatively pest free. Its purple fruit will attract birds, but can also be slightly messy and stain porous surfaces.

- Height of 40–60' and a spread of 40–60'. Medium to fast growth rate of 13" to 24+" per year.
- Sun Preference: Full sun is ideal, at least six hours of direct sunlight each day.
- Small, dark red berries that turn dark purple in mid-autumn and persist into the winter.
- Forms characteristic corky ridges and warts on trunk and branches.
- Develops a broad crown with arching branches that resembles the elm.

### Autumn Brilliance® Serviceberry (Amelanchier × grandiflora)

The Autumn Brilliance Serviceberry is an excellent, smaller tree with multi-season interest. It has very showy white flowers in April followed by purplish edible fruit in June. The excellent glossy blue-green leaves turn brilliant red-orange in fall complimented by smooth gray colored stems.

- Height of 20–25' and a spread of 15' at maturity.
- Sun Preference: full sun to partial shade.
- Berries resemble blueberries in taste and may be used in jams, jellies and pies.
- Great plant for bird gardens (birds love the berries)!
